Course Descriptions

Addiction Counseling: This course covers the spiritual connections that cause the body to fall prey to addiction. Prospective Counselors will learn to not only address addiction but learn scriptures that explain the behavior as it pertains to the Holy Scriptures.

Adolescent Counseling: This course covers the spiritual the adolescent purpose outlined in the scriptures and how the Word of God addresses children and their importance, as it pertains to the Holy Scriptures.

Advanced Apologetics: This course covers the study of Historical context, geography, and the history behind the writes of the Holy Scriptures

Advanced Curriculum Development: This course covers a more in-depth look at school establishment and curriculum planning.

Angelology: This course covers the study of Angels and the fall of the fall at the time of rebellion until now.

Anthropology: The study of the three-part creation of man as outlined in the Holy Scriptures.

A Worship Lifestyle: The course delves into the balanced life of worship, word, and work.

Bible Based Curriculum & Planning: The course covers the preparation and presentation of lessons in Biblical Studies, Theology, and Christian Education.

Bible Chronology: This course covers the historical events of the Old and New Testament scriptures in chronological order.

Biblical Statutes and Laws: This course is a look at the biblical statutes and laws listed throughout the bible and how they are applied today.

Biblical Terminology & Documentation: The course covers the development and insight into the learning processes of the church and its inner workings, including but not limited to tax laws, 501(c) 3, and church by laws and rules.

Book of Revelations I: This course covers the Biblical interpretations and background historical text of the Book of Revelations covering chapters 1-18 outlined in the Holy Scripture in correlation with the prophecies spoken in the Old Testament.

Book of Revelations II: This course covers the Biblical interpretations and background historical text of the Book of Revelations covering chapters 19-22 outlined in the Holy Scripture in correlation with the prophecies spoken in the Old Testament.

Course Descriptions Cont...

Book of Revelations III: This course covers the Biblical interpretations and background historical text of the Book of Revelations covering chapters 15-22 outlined in the Holy Scripture in correlation with the aforementioned prophecies spoken in the Old Testament.

Chaplaincy I & II: These courses cover chaplaincy, hospital etiquette, and ministering without offense to other religions.

Christian Apologetics: This course covers religious beliefs, how they compare to Christianity, and how to successfully defend the Christian belief as outlined in the King James Version Bible.

Christian Counseling I: This course covers techniques on the how, when, and why's of Christian Counseling as outlined in the Holy Scriptures. Includes introductions into Family, Adolescent, and Marriage Counseling.

Christian Counseling II: This course covers techniques on the how, when, and why's of Christian Counseling as outlined in the Holy Scriptures. Includes introductions into Addiction, Pastoral Care, and Bereavement Counseling.

Christian School Administration: A look at the development of school policies and curriculum.

Christian Worship and Pastoral Practices I: This course dives into worship and its importance into effective leadership.

Christian Worship and Pastoral Practices II: This course explores the various methods, actions, and spiritual disciplines utilized by religious leaders to care for, guide, and shepherd their congregations.

Church Administrations: The course covers the development and insight into the learning processes of the church and its inner workings, including but not limited to tax laws, 501(c) 3, and church by laws and rules.

Church Recordkeeping & Financial Reporting: The course covers financial records and reporting including but not limited to tax laws, 501(c)3, and church etiquette.

Conducting and Music Techniques: The art of directing musical scores.

Crisis Counseling II: The course covers a more in-depth consideration of the application of crisis counseling as it pertains to the Holy Scriptures.

Crisis Counseling, I: This course covers the introduction into the specialized field of crisis counseling as it pertains to the Holy Scriptures. Includes introductions into root causes of posttraumatic stress disorder, church attacks, and generational curses.

Curriculum Development and Selection II: The course covers the study of different courses to meet the needs of various learning groups; Formulating planning and writing materials with an emphasis in revivals and tent meetings.

Curriculum Development and Selection, I: The course covers the study of different courses to meet the needs of various learning groups; Formulating planning and writing materials with an emphasis in seminars and retreats.

Effective Communication & Conflict Resolution: The strategic planning and program evaluation of building a church of faithful discipleship.

Course Descriptions Cont...

Eschatology: This course covers the study of the death, judgement, and destination. Also, how to explain the promises which will occur after translation, according to the Holy Scriptures.

Ethically Written: This course covers ethical documentation, recordkeeping, and privacy laws and conduct as it pertains to the Holy Scripture.

Explore the Book: A comprehensive look at each book listed in the King James Version Bible from Genesis to Revelation.

Family and Marriage Counseling: The course covers the introduction into the specialized field of family and marriage from the foundation. It looks at the commandments of marriage and relationships found in the Holy Scriptures.

Foundations of Biblical Worship: This course explores the root and intent of worship.

Foundations of the Christian Mission: This course is a look at foundation of the Christian movement and missions from the past until now.

God's Generals: A comprehensive examination of the reasons for failures and successes in ministers both historical and present.

Grief and Bereavement Counseling: This course covers the sixteen types of grief, how to address them and how to identify them. It also covers what the bible says about grieving.

Hamartiology: This course covers the study of sin and the sinful nature, law, and hierarchy.

Hermeneutics: This course covers how to interpret the Holy Scriptures.

Introduction to Hermeneutics: This course covers the introduction of Biblical interpretations and tools provided for a sound exegery of scripture mastery

Invisible War: This course covers a look at spiritual principalities, rulers, and enemies around us.

Just Weights: This course focuses on the balanced life of every believer and how to relay it effectively.

Leadership in planning strategies: This course covers the creation of planning strategies in Christian leadership positions.

Marriage, Funeral, and Baptismal Rites: This course is a look at the ceremonial rites of marriage, funeral, and baptism.

Miracle Evangelism I: This course covers the gifts and callings of a world evangelist, televangelist, and the criteria for such an office.

Miracle Evangelism II: This course covers the gift of Miracles, the power to stir up the gifts, and the laws of faith vs fear.

Course Descriptions

Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs: This course covers deep study of biblical text of the psalms and hymns and it's importance in the psyche of believers.

Psychology of Music: The affects of musical lyrics and lyrical scores have on the human brain and its observable and measurable responses.

Psychology of Music II: The affects of music in the biblical text including the defilement of Lucifer.

Religion, Ethics, & Leadership I: This course covers the introduction into the principles of Biblical Leadership in Christian counseling which will equip students to lead and effectively examine ministry within the basics of spiritual leadership.

Religion, Ethics, & Leadership II: This course covers the introduction into the principles of Biblical Leadership in Christian counseling which will equip students to lead and effectively examine ministry within the basics of spiritual leadership.

Research and Methodology: How to study and outline the Holy Scriptures. Including but not limited to; finding viable research resources, methodology, and writing sermons.

Sanctification and Ecclesiology: This course the study of sanctification and the doctrine of ecclesiology.

Song writing by the Word: This course covers lyrical instructions on writing by the word of God.

Soteriology: This course covers the study of Salvation and its importance.

Spirit World Mechanics I: This course covers the study of the demonic world around us and their workings in the past and today.

Spirit World Mechanics II: This course covers the study of the spirit realm as it pertains to angelic hosts and the Holy Spirit.

Spiritual Application I: This course covers the outlined day to day responsibility of a disciple of Jesus Christ as outlined by the Holy Scriptures.

Spiritual Application II: This course covers a more in-depth look of the responsibility of a disciple of Jesus Christ and how to teach that life to others.

Spiritual Battles in a Natural World: This course covers world issues and their prophetic foretelling in the Bible. Also, the position of the church during these times.

Spiritual Warfare: The Open Gates: This course covers a look into the spiritual gates and why the enemy seeks to infiltrate them.

Teen Counseling: This course covers a look into the issues of adolescents and techniques based on biblical principles.

The Absolute Truth: This course covers the science of Biblical interpretations and tools provided for a sound exegery of scripture.

Course Descriptions

The Art of Worship: This course covers the Biblical teachings and importance of worship; including but not limited to sacrifice, praise, and obedience.

The Empty Vessel: This course covers the human vessel created by God and the importance of its state before, during and after worship.

The Epistles I: This course covers the letters of the Apostles as outlined in the New Testament scriptures.

The Epistles II: This course covers the letters of Paul as outlined in the New Testament scriptures.

The Five-Fold: This course looks at the actual operation and functioning in the gifts of the Five-fold ministry and how it can affect the world around you.

The Gospels: This course covers the Biblical interpretations and background historical text of the Books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John outlined in the Holy Scripture.

The Commandments: This course is an introspective look at the commandments of God, beyond the commandments from the book of Exodus.

The Great Commission: This course is a look at Evangelism from the foundation. Includes, today's view of Evangelism inside and outside of the church.

The Courts: This course covers the outer and the inner court and what happens in worship.

The Holies of Holy: This course covers the holiest place behind the veil and what that means in worship.

The Mercy Seat: This course covers the tabernacle and the significance it has on the Christian church today.

The Mission Field: This course covers world views and what to expect on the mission field.

The Poetical Books I: This course covers the foundation and explanations of the first two books of the poetical books (Job and Psalms).

The Poetical Books II: This course covers the foundation and explanations of the last three books of the poetical books (Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon).

The Political Church: A comprehensive look at the spirit realm and its workings in the political world and the role that the church should be fulfilling.

The Power of Sound: This course is a look at the power of praise, worship, speaking, and anything connected to sound.

Course Descriptions Cont...

The Role of the Apostles: This course covers the historical context of the Apostles then and now!

The Secret Place: This course is set to teach students what the secret place is, how to establish it in your lives, and the requirements for entering into such a place.

Theism vs Deism: A comprehensive look into God as creator and His intended role in our lives today.

The Power of Sound: This course covers the power of what exudes from your mouth and the power behind it outlined in the Holy Scriptures.

Theological Psychology I: This course covers a look into behavioral considerations that dictate one's path in life and how to alter that path with theological practices.

Theological Psychology II: This course takes a comprehensive look at biblical characters and how the law of the old and new testament governed their behaviors.

Theory and Practice of leadership and Organizations: A comprehensive look at the assessment, application and exploration of effective and ethical leadership practices, culture, and change processes.

Therapeutic Purpose: An in-depth study of the therapeutic process of creating and maintaining marriage and family relationships. Assessment of crisis situations including but not limited to dealing with family addiction, generational curses, and blended families.

Understanding Spiritual Authority: This course focuses on leaders of the bible and the authority given to men from the beginning.

Unspoken Law: This course focuses on the power behind words, the importance of understanding etymology, and the law of unconditional scriptural text.

Winning the Lost: This course covers understanding of unbeliever's vs the lost and how to minister to those who are lost.

World Religion: This course covers world religious beliefs and how they compare to Christianity.

Worship from the Throne room: This course covers angelology and worship from the throne room.

Worship Through the Word: This course covers worship through biblical teachings.

Writing Spiritually: This course covers understanding the art of writing by the leading of the Holy Spirit. Based on Romans 10:17 and other biblical preferences

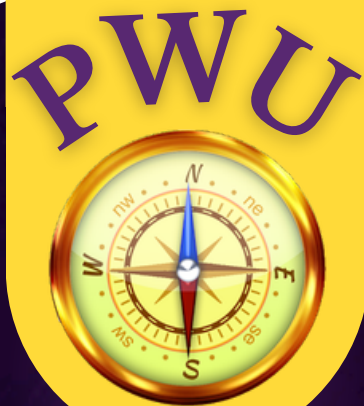

Tuition, Fees, & Return Policy

Notice:

The tuition chart does not include costs for books or registration. Book fees and tuition must be paid by the student as per the pre-enrollment agreement. These fees reflect current enrollment pricing and may change according to college policies.

Refund Policy:

A full refund of tuition, minus a \$25.00 administration fee for on-campus students and a \$50 administration fee for online students, will be granted to those who submit a written request and have not exceeded the withdrawal deadline.

- **A full refund will also be issued if the student officially drops the course before the first day of the academic semester.**

In the event that the class in which the student is enrolled is canceled due to insufficient enrollment, a full refund will be provided. A 75% refund will be given if the student officially withdraws from the class(es) on or before the official 20% point of the course term or semester.

*** Please note that registration fees are non-refundable. ***

Grade-based Standard (GPA):

Grade Point: Students must maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0. Those who do not achieve a 2.0 GPA for any semester will be placed on academic probation and notified of their academic standing at the end of each term.

If a student discovers they are on academic probation, they must schedule an appointment with their advisor/counselor immediately.

The purpose of this meeting is to help the student identify academic challenges and explore strategies for improvement.

While on academic probation, the advisor will provide recommendations regarding the appropriate course load for the student.

A student who remains on academic probation for two consecutive semesters will face suspension for one semester unless they have had a break in attendance for a full calendar year or longer.

Course Registration and Graduation Guidelines

A student may choose to retake a course for several reasons: to replace a failing grade, to strive for a higher grade, or to earn credit for courses not transferred if available at PWM. While all course grades will be documented on the transcript, only the highest grade will be utilized in the calculation of total attempted and passed credit hours, total grade points, and grade point averages.

- No course may be counted more than once toward graduation requirements.
- A course can be repeated no more than twice.
- Exceptions apply for courses graded “W”, which may be repeated more than twice with the dean's approval.

It's important to note that certain regulations might prevent veterans and other financial aid recipients from receiving aid for repeating courses that have already been passed. Students are responsible for understanding their financial aid status.

Upon successfully fulfilling all graduation requirements, students will be awarded a degree at the conclusion of the next winter semester, along with the right to receive a certified copy of their degree and transcript detailing their complete academic history.

Honor cords will also be awarded to those who meet the criteria for honors

Admissions & Credit Policy

ADMISSION

Students wishing to enroll at Praise Waiteth University must first provide the necessary proof of identification and have previously obtained either a high school diploma or a high school equivalency certificate from a state-approved public, private, or homeschool institution. Admission forms must be submitted and meet the specified deadlines before a student can be classified as either a full-time or part-time student. Transfer credits will be accepted if they satisfy educational requirements. Before transfer credits can be evaluated, completed application forms and full payment of registration fees must be submitted. Transcripts must be official; they can be accepted either from the institution bearing the school seal or sent directly from the school's office electronically or via mail, accompanied by the seal and signature of the authorized official. While unofficial transcripts may be used to assess accepted credits, official transcripts must be received before enrollment.

CREDITS

At PWU, credits are earned when the required classwork hours and instruction hours are fulfilled. The combination of these hours, along with exam hours, totals 60 hours per term and no less than 180 hours per semester. Fifteen hours correspond to one (1) credit hour. (All prerequisites must be completed before progressing to the next degree plan.) Students entering the Associate's degree program.

Academic Credit and Attendance Requirement

Credit Acceptance

Students must fulfill the high school graduation requirements or an equivalent certification. PWM accepts up to 30 secular credits towards an Associate Degree; if any of these credits are categorized as biblical, up to 60 credits may be accepted.

All accepted credits require preapproval from the Chancellor or the Academic Dean.

For a Bachelor's degree, PWM accepts up to 59 secular credits; if any are deemed biblical, up to 90 credits can be applied. Accepted credits must be academic in nature and preapproved by the Chancellor or the Academic Dean.

- To enter the Bachelor's program, students must have completed an Associate Degree and meet the transfer credit requirements for a Bible-based curriculum degree plan or any preapproved supplemental courses.

PWM will also accept up to 20 credit hours towards a Master's degree plan, with the same stipulations regarding academic nature and preapproval.

Students wishing to enroll in the Master's program must possess a Bachelor's degree and meet the transfer credit requirements for a Bible-based curriculum degree plan.

Attendance Policy

All students are required to attend 80% of class hours to successfully complete each term. Each semester consists of three terms, and the attendance percentage applies to each class term. Enrollment must be finalized by the second day of the Winter and Fall semesters to ensure students are present before the 80% attendance deadline.

Attendance & Withdrawal

Late Start Dates

Students enrolling on the second day of the term must adhere to a strict attendance policy. This means that they cannot miss any days during their enrollment period. If a student accumulates a missed day after a late start, they will be expelled from the class with a failing grade, and no refunds will be issued in this situation.

Absences, Leaves, and Make-ups

For students funded by military or ministry programs, absences may be excused and made up at the instructor's discretion. Students should notify instructors of any leaves as soon as possible. Ministry missionary trips require prior approval before departure. Should the instructor deny the leave request, students can appeal in writing to the Dean of Academics or the Chancellor. While tardiness is not tolerated, we prefer to address make-up work for tardiness rather than absences.

Withdrawals and Drops

Students who voluntarily withdraw from a course after the withdrawal period will be responsible for the full tuition cost of that class. Credit hours resulting in a grade of "W" or "WF" count toward attempted hours but do not contribute to successfully completed hours. Excessive withdrawals may impact your ability to meet satisfactory academic progress standards.

Transcripts and Life Credits

Official transcripts must be received either from the institution with the school seal or sent directly from the school's office electronically or via mail, including the seal and signature of the official in charge. Unofficial transcripts can be used to assess accepted credits, but official transcripts must be provided before a student can enroll. Life Credits will be awarded solely at the discretion of the Chancellor or Dean of Students.

Up to ten life credits may be utilized in a degree plan, provided they are supported by documentation of experience and training for evaluation prior to the start date. When life credits are applied, the corresponding credit hours will be subtracted, and no charges for those hours will be incurred by the student or the financial aid program assisting them. The funding adjustment will be processed promptly and reflected in all documentation before tuition charges are applied to the student.

G.S. STATEMENT

Degree program(s) of study offered by Praise Waiteth University have been declared exempt from the requirements for licensure under provisions of North Carolina General Statutes (G.S.) 116-15(d) for exemption from licensure with respect to religious education. Exemption from licensure is not based upon any assessment of program quality under established licensing standards.

Student Rights & Responsibilities

Right to Counseling: Students are entitled to entrance and academic counseling before entering into an agreement with the school.

Right to Accurate Information: Students have the right to receive truthful and precise information regarding grading, homework assignments, and financial obligations.

Right to Policy Changes: Students should be informed of any changes to policies, forms, or fees.

Responsibility to Inform: Students are responsible for notifying Praise Waiteth University of any changes in their name, address, phone number, attendance status, or financial situation.

Right to Safe Classrooms: Students have the right to attend safe classrooms that comply with fire codes for all instructional spaces.

Responsibility for Performance: Students are expected to uphold a standard of performance and professionalism both on campus and off.

Right to Keep Records: Students have both the right and responsibility to retain financial forms, copies of letters from the college, and any other correspondence shared.

Right to Fair Treatment: Students are entitled to fair treatment without fear of prejudice based on race, gender, or age.

College Authority: The college reserves the right to maintain a safe and orderly educational environment for both students and staff. Therefore, if college officials determine that a student's conduct poses a clear and substantial disruption, or threatens to create such a disruption, appropriate actions may be taken.

Student Rights & Responsibilities Cont.

Disruption to the College Community

In the event of disruptions within the college community, appropriate disciplinary measures will be implemented to restore and uphold the integrity of the community. Students are expected to behave in accordance with widely accepted standards of scholarship and conduct. The aim of this code is not to limit student rights but to safeguard the rights of individuals in their academic endeavors. The following regulations outline rules of conduct that prohibit certain behaviors among students. Violating any of these regulations may lead to consequences ranging from a failing grade in class to expulsion. Reinstatement after such actions will be determined solely at the discretion of the CEO/Chancellor or the Dean of Academics.

Academic Dishonesty

PWM expects all students to uphold honesty and academic integrity. Specific instances of dishonesty include cheating and plagiarism.

Cheating encompasses:

- Copying tests, assignments, projects, presentations, and similar work.
- Submitting work that has been previously submitted in another course or at another institution without instructor approval.
- Altering grades without the instructor's knowledge.
- Utilizing unapproved sources (print, electronic, or web materials, etc.) during assessments.
- Receiving or providing assistance with tests or other assignments without instructor approval.

*** Any action that misrepresents or defrauds. ***

Conduct Guidelines

Academic Integrity and College Conduct Guidelines

Plagiarism involves presenting someone else's work such as papers, tests, assignments, and projects in any format, whether printed, electronic, or online, as if it were your own.

- This includes the failure to acknowledge the original creator of any work. For guidance, refer to The Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, or other established style guides. It also encompasses submitting a purchased paper, project, or presentation as if it were your original work.

Theft and Misuse of College Property pertains to any theft, misuse, or damage of college property, as well as any theft or damage to the belongings of college community members or campus visitors while on college premises or during college events. Unauthorized access to restricted areas of college property or facilities is also considered a violation, along with remaining in a college facility after hours without permission.

Alcohol and Drug Policy prohibits the possession or use of alcoholic beverages, as well as being intoxicated on college grounds or at college-sponsored events, whether on or off campus, including in college-owned vehicles. The possession, use, or distribution of illegal drugs is strictly forbidden, except where explicitly permitted by law.

Any influence attributed to the use of drugs or alcohol does not diminish the individual's responsibility for the consequences of their actions.

Additionally, anyone who has the smell of alcohol or whose observable behavior leads a college official to believe they are under the influence of alcohol or other drugs will not be permitted on college premises or at any college activities.

Conduct Violations

Code of Conduct Violations

Mental or Physical Abuse

Any form of mental or physical abuse directed towards individuals on college premises or at college-sponsored or supervised events is strictly prohibited. This includes verbal or physical actions that threaten or jeopardize the health or safety of others. Such behavior is defined by both subjective (the recipient's perspective) and objective (a reasonable person's perspective) criteria, and it significantly impacts a student's ability to engage in or benefit from college programs or activities.

****Note:**** A student posing a serious imminent risk of harm (e.g., threats of violence against students or staff) will be expelled immediately. Personal combat will not be tolerated.

Sexually Suggestive or Harassing Behavior

Any acts, comments, or behaviors that are sexually suggestive or harassing in nature are prohibited. These actions must be severe and pervasive, evaluated from both the subjective viewpoint of the recipient and the objective perspective of a reasonable person, thereby affecting a student's ability to participate in or benefit from college programs or activities.

Obstruction or Disruption

Deliberate obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary proceedings, or any other college-related activities, including public service functions and authorized events on college premises, is not allowed.

Legal Violations

Any action that violates the law and impacts students at PWM will be treated as a violation of PWM rules and regulations.

Student Grievance Policy

Our mission is to address students' needs fairly, without bias or violation of rights, rules, and regulations. In the event of a violation or perceived violation, students have the right to seek support through complaints, which will be evaluated and addressed appropriately:

A. Informal Resolution

Students are encouraged to engage directly with the mentor or staff member most involved in the issue. If this conversation does not lead to a resolution, or if it is deemed inappropriate, the student may opt to file an informal complaint or submit a formal written complaint.

B. Informal Complaint

Students may register an informal complaint within thirty (30) days of the incident in question. However, addressing the issue sooner enhances the chances of a satisfactory resolution. Complaints relating to academic matters should be directed to the dean, while other complaints should be taken to the head of the relevant College office. Informal complaints can be submitted via telephone or email. The appropriate College staff will review the student's concerns and determine if any action is warranted. Students will receive notification of the University's response within twenty (20) days of submitting the informal complaint. If the student remains dissatisfied with the outcome or resolution attempts, they may then proceed to file a formal complaint.

C. Formal Complaint

A formal complaint must be submitted in writing to the president or the head of the appropriate office relevant to the complaint. Formal complaints must be filed within sixty (60) days of the event that triggered the complaint and should specify the nature of the grievance and the remedy sought. Any prior attempts to resolve the issue should also be detailed.

Receipt of the complaint will be acknowledged within fifteen (15) days. The relevant College administrator will then review the matter. A final written determination, including any proposed resolution, will be sent to the student within thirty (30) days of receiving the complaint. The Praise Waiteth University office will maintain a complete record of formal complaints, and the outcomes will be stored in a centralized database as well as the student's private file.

Periodic Evaluations

Evaluations are mandated by Praise Waiteth University's Administration to assess students' satisfactory academic progress at the end of each term (fall, winter, summer). This assessment determines eligibility for the upcoming term.

Satisfactory Academic Progress Evaluations:

- Includes all periods of enrollment, regardless of whether students received financial aid.
- Consider credit hours earned at other institutions that have been transferred into the student's program of study at PWM.

If a student has an unsatisfactory academic status or a grade point average below 2.0 for more than two semesters, they may be placed on academic probation. During this probationary period, which lasts for two semesters, students may be required to take additional classes aimed at improving their academic performance.

To regain good standing, students must raise their academic record above 2.0 for two consecutive semesters. If students are withdrawn due to unsatisfactory academic records, they must pay out of pocket for one semester and successfully complete that semester before returning to regular status. Upon return, they will be on academic probation for one semester, which includes a class focused on enhancing academic performance.

E. Record Retention

Records will be maintained onsite in active status for as long as the student remains enrolled. For students who exit the college, records will be retained for a minimum period of 25 years.

F. Compliance with Regulations

In accordance with federal and state regulations, the Dean of Academics at PWM is obligated to assess a student's satisfactory academic progress at the conclusion of each term. This evaluation is crucial for determining financial aid eligibility for the subsequent term.

Key Points of Evaluation:

Reviews will encompass all enrollment periods, regardless of whether students received financial aid during those times.

Assessments will also consider credit hours earned at other institutions that have been transferred into the student's program of study.
